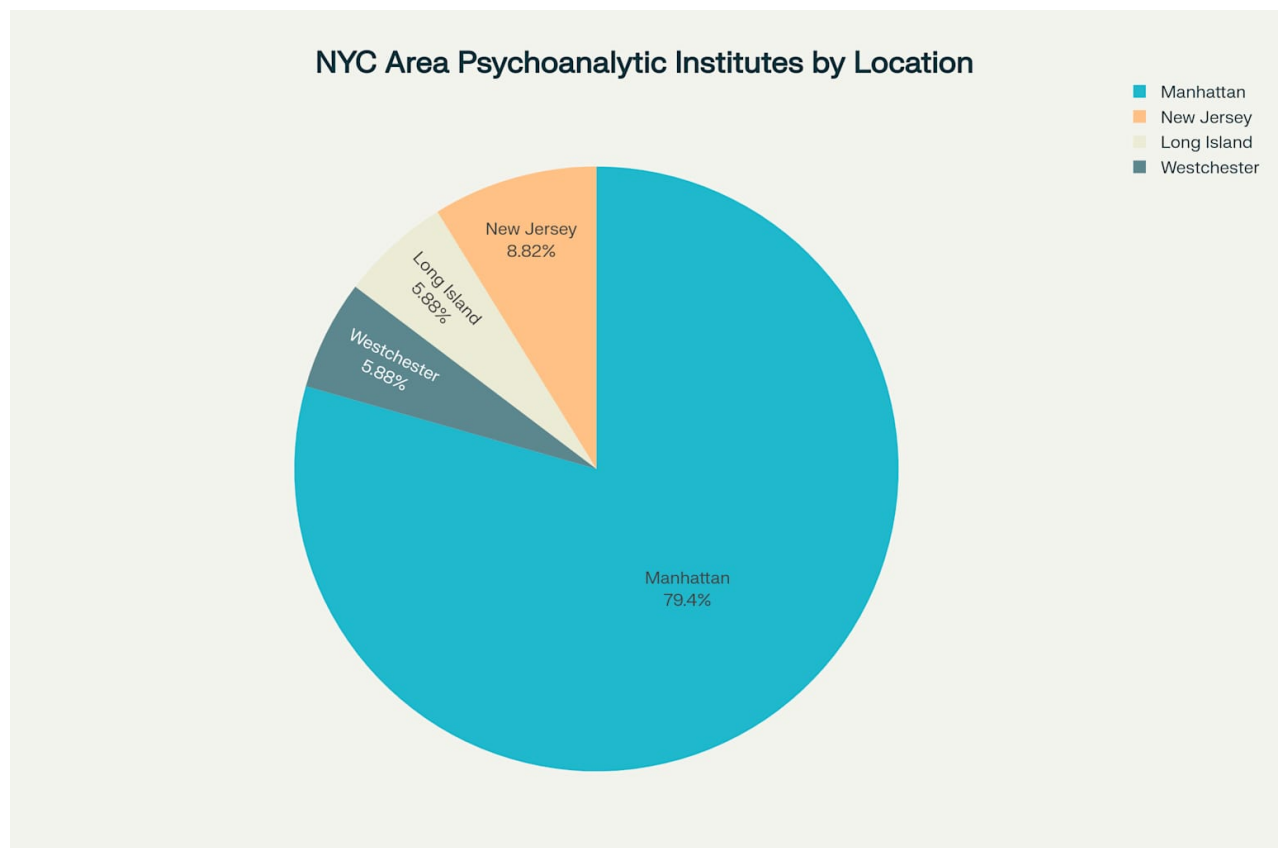


Building a Wiki Directory of NYC Psychoanalytic Training Institutes

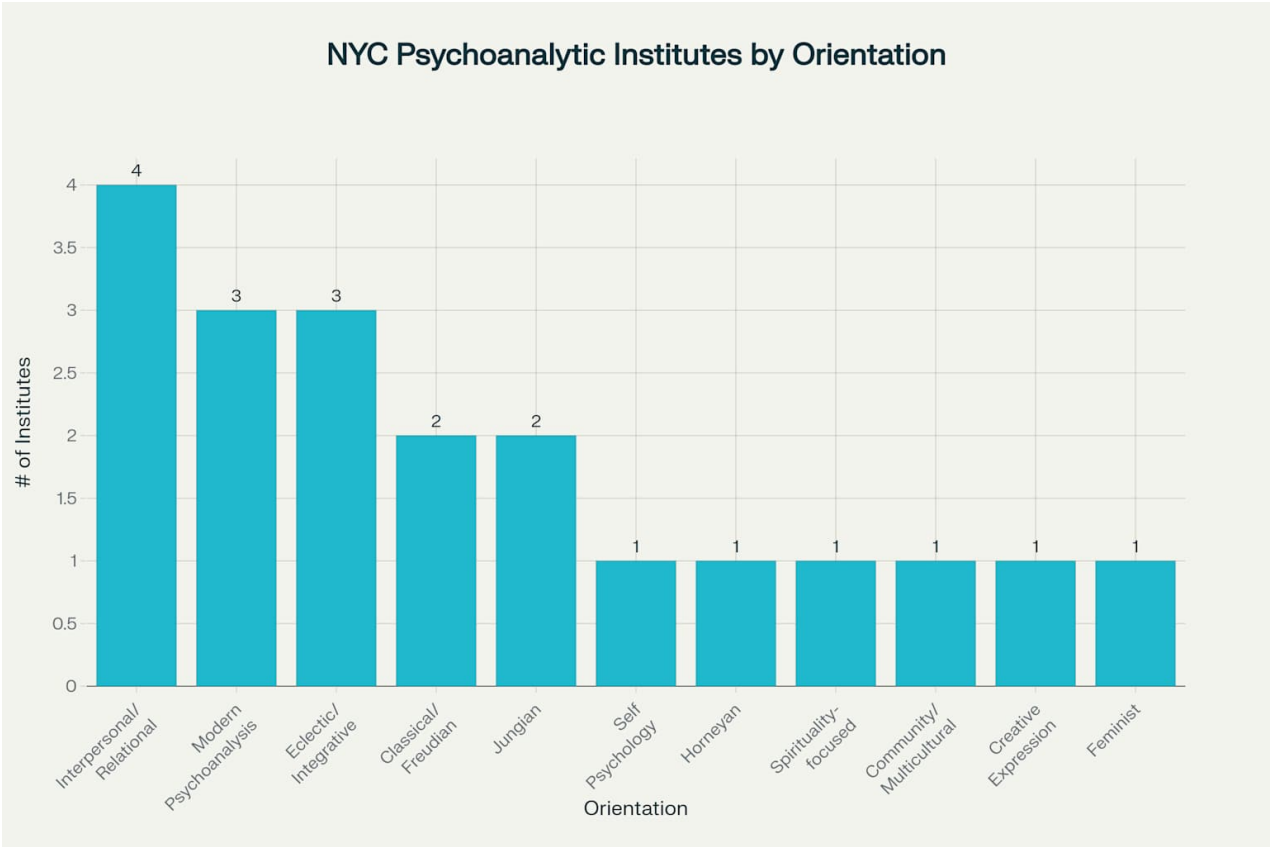
