Theoretical Orientation

The White Institute is grounded in the interpersonal tradition of psychoanalysis, which was developed by Harry Stack Sullivan, Erich Fromm, Clara Thompson, and other founders who broke from classical Freudian approaches. The interpersonal approach emphasizes the human qualities of the analyst, the co-created nature of the analytic relationship, and the importance of social and cultural influences on development. In recent decades, the Institute has been instrumental in the development of relational psychoanalysis, which extends interpersonal concepts by incorporating elements of object relations theory, self psychology, and intersubjective approaches. The Institute maintains its commitment to a psychoanalytic vision that is relationally focused, socially aware, and attentive to the fullness of human experience.

Minimum Degree: Varies by program. For the Psychoanalysis program, a graduate degree in a mental health field or another field plus additional requirements.

History

The William Alanson White Institute was founded in the 1940s by a group of psychoanalysts including Harry Stack Sullivan, Clara Thompson, and Erich Fromm, who sought to develop an approach to psychoanalysis that incorporated social and cultural factors more fully than classical Freudian theory. Named after the prominent American psychiatrist William Alanson White, the Institute has been at the forefront of American psychoanalytic innovation for over 70 years. Notable figures associated with the Institute include Edgar Levenson, Jay Greenberg, Stephen Mitchell, and Jessica Benjamin, all of whom have made significant contributions to psychoanalytic theory and practice. The Institute played a central role in the development of relational psychoanalysis in the 1980s and 1990s, which has become an influential movement in contemporary psychoanalysis.
